

"Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people producing its fruits." (Matt 21:43)

There may be no single section of Scripture that more concisely summarizes Jesus' **season of confrontation** than Matthew 21 and 22. Just days before his crucifixion, Israel's long-awaited Messiah tells three powerfully-pointed parables that bring his most hard-hearted hearers face-toface with the crisis of decision. Let's take a moment to appreciate the context:

- On **Sunday**, Jesus makes his triumphal entry into Jerusalem (21:1-11)
- On **Monday**, he cleanses the temple (21:12-17)
- On **Tuesday**, the chief priests and elders challenge his authority (21:23-27)

In response, Jesus tells the following three parables. Take the time to carefully read them with this setting in mind. **What do they help us see?** How does the arrival and upside-down nature of heaven's kingdom impact *everything*?

• The parable of the two sons (Matt 21:28-32) -

• The parable of the wicked tenants (Matt 21:33-46) -

• The parable of the wedding feast (Matt 22:1-14) -
