To Eve ([Gen 3:16](#))

"I will surely multiply your _____ in childbearing; in pain you shall bring forth children. Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you."

To Adam ([Gen 3:17-19](#))

"By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall _____."

To the Serpent ([Gen 3:14-15](#))

"Because you have done this, cursed are you above all livestock and above all beasts of the field; on your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life. I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your _____, and you shall bruise his _____."



For Class & Family Discussion:

- Adam and Eve tried to hide from God in the garden (and it didn't work), but they aren't the only ones who have tried.
 - What does [Psalm 139:1-12](#) teach us about "hiding" from God?
 - Why is this message actually really good news?
- Let's notice [Genesis 3:9-13](#) together. When they couldn't hide from God, what did Adam and Eve try next? Why was this a problem?
- Listen to Eve in [Genesis 3:13](#): "The serpent deceived me."
 - We started this series in [Revelation 12:9](#) with Satan described as "the deceiver of the whole world." How can we possibly win against this deceiver?
 - Let's listen to [John 1:14](#) and [8:31-32](#). Satan is the deceiver; what about Jesus?
