


In a world where many–young and old–believe "Nobody stays together anymore," it's important for us to understand how seriously God takes **covenants**–relationships based on promises–including the covenant of **marriage**. Marriage doesn't involve just two; marriage involves **three**:



In Matthew 19:6, Jesus plainly revealed God's role in the covenant of marriage: "So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has ______ together, let not man separate." When God "ties" a man to a woman in marriage, she is his "wife _____ " (Mal 2:14).

You've heard grooms and brides "exchange vows" at wedding ceremonies. That's much more than a cute custom! Vows are "solemn promises." When a groom and bride make those vows, they are entering into a special relationship based on promises—a **covenant** where God is joining them together for life. It's no wonder then that we read in Hebrews 13:4:

Let marriage be held in _____ among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous.

For Class & Family Discussion:

- Why is it dangerous to treat something like marriage as if it's disposable?
- Of all the places Jesus could go to answer the Pharisees' question in Matthew 19, why go back to "the beginning"?

- Many don't like to hear language like "for God will judge" (Heb 13:4b). So why warn us in that way? What does all of this tell us about the God of covenants?
