“You must not do that! I am a fellow servant with you... Worship God.” (Rev 22:8-9)

Revelation 4 helps us see the **WHO** answer clearly.

“Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God _____,

In **Revelation 4:11**, worshipful language continues. It’s helpful to think of worship in terms of worth. Worship is acknowledging the _____ of God.

...and thus let us offer to God _____
worship, with reverence and awe...

- **Hebrews 12:28** called us to offer acceptable worship “with **reverence and awe**”? What do those words mean?
- Why do we need consistent reminders that God is the only One worthy of our worship?
