

Nothing matters more than building a relationship with God. Knowing God is more important than knowing anything else (Hosea 6:3; John 17:3). But God is always more than I can understand. God is ALWAYS bigger than I can fit in my little brain (John 1:18; Romans 1:23; 1 Timothy 1:17; 6:16).

One of the great truths revealed in the Bible is that there is only \_\_\_\_\_ God (Deuteronomy 6:4). But, throughout the Bible, we read about God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. That's hard to understand, isn't it? Is God one or three?

Maybe this will help: Do you ever get lonely? You know what that feels like because you are one being who is one person. When you're alone, you might get lonely because it's just you, by yourself.

But God is more. God is **one being** in **THREE persons**. Not three Gods; just one. Not one person; three persons. What does that mean? What's it look like? Maybe the best place to start is to notice how a few of the events in Jesus' life are described:

- Jesus' (Matthew 3:16-17) Jesus' commission (Matthew 28:19)
- Jesus' \_\_\_\_\_ (John 14:25-26)



All this month, we're going to dig into our Bibles and stretch our brains to try

and understand our AWESOME God better. We'll learn this month that God the Father had a

wonderful plan to send God the Son to save us and God the Spirit to guide us.

Do you know what that means and why it matters? It's a great reminder that:

## **FOUNDATION STONES**

Can we read a few passages in our Bibles together to help us dig a little deeper? First up, Acts 17:29. Next, Romans 1:20.



Finally, Colossians 2:9. Did you notice some REALLY important words in those verses? "The divine being." "Divine nature." "Deity." Those are words used in the Bible to describe our AWESOME God.

But what about other beings. Are humans "divine" beings? Do angels have "divine nature"? Is the devil "deity"? If not, what does that tell us about our God?

It would be good for us to read the whole story of Jesus' baptism together. Let's read Matthew 3:1-6 and Matthew 3:13-17 together. What can we learn?
