1 • Who (or What) is the Holy Spirit?

That's a question worth diving into because it helps us get to know God better. We'll move quickly through the list below (leaving plenty of time for discussion together), but the **BIG**



idea for today's session is simple: the Holy Spirit is not a "what." The Holy Spirit is a "who." The Holy Spirit is not an "it"—some impersonal force in the universe like gravity. The Holy Spirit is a personal being—a "he" who is described in a wide variety of ways:

 - Matthew 28:18-20: at the heart of the "Great Commission"
 - Acts 10:36-38: Peter's proclamation of the gospel to Cornelius and his household
 - 2 Corinthians 13:14: Paul's prayer for the saints in Corinth
 - Ephesians 2:14-18: Paul's message of unifying peace between Jew and Gentile

What we're being shown is three distinct personalities that enjoy perfect unity and harmony.
