When the people saw the that he had done, they said, "This is indeed who is to come into the world!" Perceiving then that they were about to come and to make him king, Jesus withdrew again to the mountain by himself. (6:14-15)

## For Class & Family Discussion:

	Like other miracles described in his Gospel, the miracle of feeding the 5,000 is described by John as a "sign" (6:14). What sort of sign? What did it prove? To what was it pointing?
•	When the people said, "This is indeed the Prophet who is to come into the world!" (6:14), what were they talking about? Deuteronomy 18:15-18 might be helpful here
•	What does the second miracle in John 6 (verses 16-21) reveal about the power and character of Jesus?
•	The next day, why do you think the people brought up the fact that their forefathers "ate the manna in the wilderness" (6:31)? What does this have to do with what they had said in 6:14?
•	Why did Jesus say what he said in 6:26-27? What did he mean by this?
•	We learned in Lesson 2 that Jesus will say "I am." seven different times in John's Gospel and 6:35 is the first. What did he mean by, "I am the bread of life"? What is he trying to help these people see and understand? John 6:40 might be really helpful here

•	In 6:51, 64, and 70-71, what does John help us understand about Jesus?
