

We're learning, discussing, and memorizing a simple acronym - **P.S.A.L.M.S.** - that can provide a framework for prayer:

P	: "God, I praise you for…"
S	: "God, if I have you, it is enough; I am satisfied because…'
A	: "God, please be merciful and gracious; I"
L	: "God, I need you; lead me in…"

Let's focus on the fourth letter: **LEADING**. In your own words, what does it mean to be "led" by someone other than yourself? What does it *take* to be led by someone else? There are obviously lots of possibilities as to whose lead we will follow; why should we be willing to say this to God? What are we really communicating when we say to him, "Lead me"?

"God, I need you; lead me in..."

Psalm 5:1-8 is a great example of this sort of prayer.

Take a moment to notice and think about where the psalmists were praying that the LORD would lead them in 23:2-3 and 25:5. In your own words, what are they saying?
Let's open our Bibles together back to Psalm 31 and study the impact this sort of prayer
had on David. In 31:3, he acknowledged God as his rock and his fortress, "and for your name's sake you lead me and guide me." Look before and after verse 3. When David prayed, "I need you, O God; lead me…" what impact did that have on his life?
